It is a national charity who specialise in enterprise education and financial education. It was a chance for many of our school's budding entrepreneurs to enhance their skills in an environment catered to bettering the participants as young businessmen and women but also allowing them to perfect the art of working as a team for a collective goal.

We spoke to student Adrian Wojcek who assumed a leadership role within the business and had nothing but compliments for the opportunity to gain experience in leading a business. "At times it became very stressful but on the whole the experience itself massively out grew my expectations, in terms of enjoyment." He continued to tells us why he thought Young Enterprise would be something he wanted to be involved with "When I heard about it, I thought it would be a fantastic opportunity to work on my leadership and learn, in a low risk environment, how running a business works on a day to day basis."

Adrian told us about the adversity he and his colleagues had to overcome during the process of deciding to what buy and sell. "Initially the plan was to buy ties from overseas and sell them on market day but with the time constraints and factor of high expenditure, we decided to look elsewhere for a product." The initial setback didn't keep the business team down for long, as they found their product in the form of hand crafted vinyl bowls and handmade ear rings. "We were really happy with the end products and we were all really excited to see how they'd be received on market day" were the words of operations director Tuan Tran.

For managing director, Adrian, he felt that the lead up to market day was the most testing throughout the journey. "The few days before we went to market were very stressful and took over my life for a brief period!" But the fears he may have had over market day were soon forgotten, as Adrian explains "Despite it being a very long day, I was there for 10 hours, it all ran very smoothly and was a huge success. All the team put in a lot of effort and it was rewarded with the great reception of our products, from the customers at the market."

Asked if he'd encourage others to seek the same opportunity he did, Adrian answered simply "Yes, it opens your eyes to the importance of co-operation and team work, whilst having lots of fun."
