
She trains for anything between 1-7 hours a week with her team, as well as extra training on top to properly perfect her technique. Cereal bars are her favourite pre-training snack.

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YOUNG ENTERPRISE

Business is booming as students from the Becket take on another year of Young Enterprise!

We spoke to Managing Director Josh Darby back in November, when their business was just taking off, to find out everything we needed to know about their product and what makes it stand out. He told us: "Our business idea is to upcycle coffee sacks into a range of sustainable products." He continued: "We are progressing very rapidly through our business. So far we have developed our first product idea (a tote bag) and we already have been able to develop multiple prototypes. Following extensive market research, we have been able to make our product the perfect length and shape for what we think everyone loves."

The group started out with a stock of 30 tote bags and successfully had their first release date on December 1st (which went considerably well, as stock rapidly sold out). Customers were allowed to preorder the bags off the Young Enterprise Trading Station, which they promoted through their rapidly growing social media account (@sacked_stores on Instagram). Josh added: "I would definitely recommend Young Enterprise to others as it is a great opportunity to learn about being apart of a business and how it works."





Recently, we checked in on the group again, this time speaking to secretary Aidan Shaw, who filled us in on how the group's appearance at Sneinton Market went.

"We were competing against other schools (High School, Rushcliffe, East Leake, Toot hill), each selling our own unique products. We all set up little stalls to represent our brand and sell our product. There was very little turnout for the first hour or so but around lunch people started coming down. Parents also came down later on, to add to the footfall at the market.



There was a good atmosphere amongst the teams as everyone was eager to sell their products that they had worked hard to make. The weather also helped the mood around the market, as it was held outdoors. There were a few interesting products from other groups, but also a few we didn't like as much.
