James Webster ran the 1500m, placing first in a group of approximately 16 runners! He was nervous to begin with but prepared by listening to music, and not talking to anyone just before his race. Got to get in the zone! He has experience in running long distance, after competing in the cross country county and national championships, (although he doesn't reminisce on nationals in a positive way, remembering how he pulled his hamstring and got spiked by another runner's shoes). 

NATIONAL FINALISTS: SACKED STORES



It's been months since we last caught up with Sacked Stores, Becket's Young Enterprise group, and they've definitely been busy. Since Sneinton market, the group has gone on to proceed to the national level of the competition- going further than any other Becket Young Enterprise group has before. We brought back Josh Darby and Aidan Shaw to talk about the team's progress.

First they had to win the Nottingham final, where they not only bagged the Company of the Year award for the Nottingham region but also best trade stand and a financial management prize as well. Their first competition took place at the Nottingham Trent Dryden enterprise building, whilst the others took place online due to the scale of the competition increasing.

"For each round we had to submit an interview, a company report, and a presentation, with an additional 4 minute presentation being required for the last two rounds of the competition"

Aidan told us about the regional finals, "We went to the regional finals, where we won, beating the likes of Nottingham High School, Loughborough Grammar School and a few other private, grammar and state schools. We won the best promotional video award (their 30 second promotional video consisted of Will Parker's mum with her dog and a sacked store bag promoting the teams website) and then we also won Best Regional Company of the year."

Josh then told us about the national finals, where the team earned their place in the top 14 in the country. "To prepare for the national final we had a big interview (10 minutes) with around 20 questions asked. We submitted our video and our promotional video and made it to the finals." Although the team didn't progress any further in the competition, their journey was hugely impressive, as they reached the national level of a competition with around 665 other young enterprise groups.

The group is currently in discussion with each other about what to do with their brand (whether to extend their product range or fold). They recently had a meeting with the manager of the company Affari, Craig Brothers, who gave the group inspiration to continue and expand, but they remain undecided as to what the future holds for Sacked Stores.

However, they both reminisce positively on their experience, reflecting on the team leadership, communication and management skills they learnt and the confidence they gained.
