
students voted for their favourite books. We spoke to year 7's restless readers Gabriel, Zasha,

On the 27th of March, the English Speaking Union Schools' Mace Grand Final took place at the historic Dartmouth House located in London. The Schools' Mace, founded in 1957, is the oldest and largest debating competition for schools in England. It involves around 300 schools each year, including the most prestigious institutions across the country. After months of preparation, hard work and dedication, The Becket School debate team was named regional champions of the East Midlands, which permitted their entrance into the final stages of the competition. This final team was made up of Aoife Reynolds, Caitlin Collins and Rosie Bell; Mr Gould and Mr Pell accompanying them. During the months leading

up to this event, the team competed with other schools in the area, hosting and attending

rounds which they dominated each time. Caitlin comments that though it was her and Aoife's first time debating, Rosie having previous experience in this very competition before, she quickly became more comfortable in her arguing skills due to the support she was offered by Mr Gould and her teammates.

Caps Off Notts!

Young Enterprise is a national organisation and charitable group in the UK and across the European Union, overseeing a selection of individual companies on various educational levels. They work directly with young people, teachers and volunteers to equip them with transferable skills to aid them in their future careers and business endeavours. The Becket has operated alongside Young Enterprise for the last five years and at the start of each academic year, Mr Bestwick gives an overview of the Young Enterprise scheme, encouraging people to participate. This introduction leads to an initial meeting for any Year 12s hoping to get involved, where they gain an understanding of what goes into running their own company.



By June, this year's team had won the second round of competition at the East Midlands Level, beating a variety of local schools including Nottingham High School. The Becket team's product stood out notably from other competitors, as a result of its unique nature. The handmade coasters, manufactured from recycled bottle caps, can be seen online already, but they have never been brought into the Young Enterprise domain before.

Another reason for the success of the company is their ability in presenting and communicating their plans. Aoife Rendu and

Molly Walker went across some 20 bars and restaurants in Nottingham to discuss acquiring bottle tops that would otherwise be disposed of. At the same time, they were able to educate these companies on the correct ways of disposing of bottle caps to ensure they are recycled correctly. The team had a strong internal drive and they were able to sell themselves incredibly well in the presentation stage of the competition. Their market stall was also particularly successful, and this combination of skill and effort is what guaranteed this first win.

In June, the company took part in the National Final, where they were one of the 8 runners-up, out of over 6000 teams who originally participated in the competition. They also won the Delta Pursuit of Opportunity Award, which was for demonstrating great resilience in seeking out

opportunities for their business. They forged creative and strategic partnerships to drive their business forward.

SSC is a national charity set up and run by teachers who wanted to create a dynamic, exciting template that could be used by schools all over the country and across all age groups. Here at The Becket School, Mrs Ralfe is the School Council Staff Lead and in September she set up a Communication Team, who are central to the council and how it is run. The Communication Team includes representatives from across all year groups who applied to take part. They are responsible for sharing information with the rest of the school on new initiatives, student voice findings and the progress of existing school improvement projects. So far, our Communication Team have set up a range of whole school votes and have been proactive in getting Action Teams up and running. Every month, the Communication Team meets and sets up a vote on the SSC website. We send this vote out via link to all form groups. This vote gives all students an opportunity to share their opinion in a small group before casting their vote as a group of 3 or 4 in their form. All of the results are collated for the Communication Team, who analyse the findings at their next meeting and set up an Action Team if it makes sense to do so.

We currently have a Green Action Team and a Study Action Team. The Green Action Team have met with Aspens to feedback student opinions and queries on canteen food and have future meetings planned on this. They have also delivered a proposal to school and trust leaders, pitching for new water machines around school. The Study Action Team are newly formed and will be looking at ways to deliver study skills and share expertise across year groups. The first stage of involvement is voting with your form group when the monthly class vote arrives. It was a stunning end to a stunning performance. Being roughly an hour in length, the performance effortlessly retained the audience's attention for the entirety of the piece.

Cracking Codes



On Monday 20th March 140 year 8 students and 14 staff visited Bletchley Park - the home of the World War 2 Codebreakers.

Bletchley Park was set up to decode intercepted Nazi messages that had been encrypted using Enigma machines. The machine (of which a

number of varying types were produced)

resembled a typewriter. The Enigma machine was invented by a German engineer Arthur Scherbius

shortly after WW1. It had a lamp board above the keys with a lamp for each letter. The

operator pressed the key for the plaintext letter of the message and the enciphered letter lit up on the lamp board. It was adopted by the German armed forces between 1926 and 1935.

This was a Maths, History and Computing trip and as part of the day they had a guided tour, learned about how Morse code was used to communicate in the lead up to D-Day, and the top secret work of the codebreakers, including Alan Turing, in breaking the German Enigma Code. The students also had some free time to explore the mansion and the codebreaking huts, as

well as a visit to the gift shop! The students had previously had lessons in school on some of the background to the events of D-Day and the work of the codebreakers to prepare them for the visit.

Chemists Of The Future

During the week of 5th June, a group of 9 Year 12 Chemistry students participated in a nationwide schools' analyst competition in partnership with the Royal Society of Chemistry. The purpose of this competition was to showcase their practical skills in analytics, utilising both familiar and innovative techniques. The students engaged in various experiments such as titrations, chromatography, and other practical activities aimed at enhancing their existing knowledge in the field. The theme of this year's competition was "baking", as the practicals revolved around familiar solids used in baking and the Year 12's had to use their applied abilities to make informed inferences based on what the Royal Society of Chemistry had sent us.



To ensure efficiency and encourage independent thinking, the students were divided into groups of three. Each group had the responsibility of successfully navigating through the assigned practical tasks, with the goal of completing their work and submitting their findings for evaluation. The submitted work will be assessed both within the school and the wider region, providing the students with an opportunity to win recognition based on their performance.

By participating in this competition, the Year 12 Chemistry students were able to demonstrate their proficiency in practical, analytical skills, explore new techniques, and expand upon their existing knowledge. Furthermore, the competition fostered the development of problem-solving and teamwork skills, as the students devoted considerable time to deliberating and collaborating with their teams.
