Becket School Council Interview

Our new Student Council aims to improve the school and make it more appealing for our students. The council gives students the opportunity to contribute on a range of issues and gives them a voice. Mrs Ralfe leads the council, and the students we spoke to said that she creates an accepting environment for them to express their ideas. They meet once a week and within the council the current subdivisions are: the green team and the diversity team (with more subgroups to be created). At the moment there are roughly ten students in the council, so the group is able to have different perspectives on ways to help the school. As they are students themselves, they are really able to know and emphasise what needs to be focused on. One student said "If you really want to make a difference and make your voice heard, student council is the way to go."

At the moment the student council is fundraising for a rented water fountain that the school can use. It will be put in the atrium and will be accessible to all students in order for us to reduce our plastic waste. In order to raise money there was a second hand book sale, a funded Christmas jumper day and a Becket Hydrates fund on Arbor that parents and students could contribute to. Mrs Ralfe explained that there was a survey taken to see how the school could be more environmentally friendly, and the most common answer was to reduce the use of single use plastic bottles by having better water fountains around school. It was unsustainable to use plastic bottles, and many people could not refill their own water bottles due to the toilet water fountains being avoided by most students. The idea was presented to the school leaders, who heartily agreed, so the council were keen to act and

were given permission to fundraise. Due to many factors, education has been underfunded for a long time, so the Becket School Council is trying to make positive changes themselves. The first step is the water fountain, which will hopefully be the first domino in a successful string of improvements.

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Digging Up History

The Despatch met up with Matthew Butler, Year 12, an up-and-coming palaeontologist, to ask him all about his love of fossil finding.

TBD: What is your most exciting fossil find?

MB: The rib section of a diplodocus.

TBD: What TV show did you appear on? **MB:** In an episode of Digging for Britain.

TBD: What is the oldest thing you have ever found?

MB: A 200 million year old ammonite.

TBD: What is the most recent finding you have been involved in?

MB: The head of an Ichthyosaur.

TBD: Who have you worked with?

MB: Palaeontologist Dean Lomax and Dr Emma Nichols

TBD: What do you enjoy most about fossil finding?

MB: The feeling that what you are finding has been under your feet for millions of years, and the fact that it tells a story of what life was like billions of years ago.

TBD: What is the most challenging part of fossil finding?

MB: Knowing what you're looking for, what bones fit with what part of the body and on which layers of earth you would find certain fossils. Sometimes fossils can look like regular rocks on the surface.

TBD: What is the process like?

MB: For smaller rocks, like those on rocky beaches, you unearth them with a knife and trowel. For bigger fossils like full bodied dinosaurs, you build a trench, dig around the fossil, put a cast like reinforcement over the fossils and remove layers of rock carefully. **Written by Andrew Leu**


