Welcome to this year's first EAL newsletter! We are thrilled to share with you the latest developments and information to be able to support pupils, families and staff.

English as an Additional Language at The Becket School

The Becket School warmly welcomes children who speak English as an Additional Language (EAL)*. We have over 81 languages represented amongst just over 350 EAL pupils.

At The Becket School we recognise that being a speaker of more than one language has many benefits, and we celebrate the wide array of skills and cultures that EAL pupils bring to the classroom. We also recognise that the needs and language abilities of EAL learners will vary, from those who speak little English to those who are fluent.

Our aim is to provide quality classroom-based teaching, and where necessary, individual support based on individual needs of children.

Ms Boothe, our EAL Co-ordinator, is working with staff to monitor the development of the language skills of EAL pupils and support them across the school.

We encourage parents to continue speaking their first language to children at home, as a strong foundation in a first language helps children to learn other languages (including English) more easily. Another way that parents can support EAL learners is by discussing topics and new concepts in their home language.

* In England, such learners are defined as those who have been 'exposed to a language at home that is known or believed to be other than English' (Department for Education, 2019).

Increased scrutiny from Ofsted

The Education Inspection Framework now includes specific expectations for how schools support EAL learners, ensuring better provision for this group. Inspectors will assess the following:

- High expectations: Leaders and teachers must not lower expectations for EAL pupils.
- Accurate assessment: English language proficiency must be assessed accurately and regularly to inform support.
- Speaking and listening opportunities:
 Schools should provide more opportunities for EAL pupils to talk with staff and peers.
- Focus on vocabulary: Teachers need to focus on the specific vocabulary, including subject-specific terms, that pupils need to understand new concepts.



The Department for Education, the Teachers' Standards and Ofsted expect that all learners, including those with English as an Additional Language, are provided with instruction that allows them to develop knowledge and skills across the curriculum. This may require teachers to adapt teaching if necessary. All subject teachers are required to support learners using EAL across the curriculum as well as teach English language to all learners more broadly.

All <u>resources</u> on the Bell Foundation website support teachers to achieve these goals and have teaching notes containing both language and curriculum objectives. These aim to support subject teachers to incorporate language development into their everyday lesson planning alongside learning objectives for the subject content.
